



CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the stories from the birth of Moses through the 40 years of the Exodus.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Moses at the Burning Bush
- The Ten Plagues of Egypt
- Moses parts the Red Sea
- The Ten Commandments

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"You shall have no other gods before me." Exodus 20:3

"God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM. This is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I AM has sent me to you." Exodus 3:14

- So many exciting Bible stories are found in Exodus! Exodus starts 280 years after the death of Joseph in Egypt with the birth of Moses. Moses was born in 1526 BC. Chapters 1-2 cover events before Moses was called to lead Israel out of Egypt.
- Chapter 3 covers the story of the Burning Bush and Moses' call
- Chapters 7-12 cover the Ten Plagues of Egypt, including the Passover, established with the 10th plague that called for the death of the oldest child of both man and beast.
- Chapters 13 begins the Exodus
- Chapter 20 contains the 10 Commandments.
- The stories are basically over for the remaining 20 chapters, except that chapter 32 contains the story of the Golden Calf. The other chapters contain laws and instructions for the constructing of the first tabernacle. A tabernacle was like a temple, only portable in the desert.






EXODUS

Exodus means "departure." The Book of Exodus is about Israel's departure from the south, where they were slaves, back to Canaan, where Father Abraham was originally sent by God 500 years earlier. After Israel came back, they would have to take the land that would become their nation. They thought the journey would last a few months. It lasted 40 years. Why? Because the people needed to become strong and faithful. The first half of the Book of Exodus is their journey. The

CLAIMS TO FAME:

Contains many laws for the Hebrew people. It is not often studied by Christians because Jesus freed us from the letter of the law.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For the life of a creature is in the blood, and I have given it to you to make atonement for yourselves on the altar; it is the blood that makes atonement for one's life. **Leviticus 17:11**

Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against anyone among your people, but love your neighbor as yourself. I am the LORD. *Leviticus 19:18*

- Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful.
- It is decreed in this book that priests shall be members of the tribe of Levi and descendants of Moses' brother Aaron.
- Moses describes things are that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects.



CLAIMS TO FAME: The famous "40 years" of desert wandering is established in Numbers for the Hebrew people. Israel could have been a nation after two or three years, but Numbers shows them being terrible fighters with little to no faith, so God sends them to wander and build maturity and strength.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Spies saw giants in the land Moses wanted to invade, and grieved the Lord with their lack of faith;
- An enemy, Balak, easily taught the people of Israel to worship Baal, a false god, and they upset God so badly that 24,000 of them died.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

God is not a human, that he should lie, not a human being, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act? Does he promise and not fulfill? Numbers 23:19

But as for you, your bodies will fall in this wilderness. Your children will be shepherds here for forty years, suffering for your unfaithfulness, until the last of your bodies lies in the wilderness. Numbers 14:32-33

- Numbers takes the reader on the long journey through a desert that lasted 40 years because the people failed tests of endurance, ethics, good judgment, and faith.
- There are some long lists in this book, including two censuses.






NUMBERS

Hence, Numbers 14 is where God gave the sentence that they would wander for decades. Israel could have been a nation after two or three years. But the Book of Numbers shows them being awful fighters at first with little to no faith. Therefore God sends them to wander and build maturity and strength. There are some long lists in this book, including two censuses.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Yeah, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. Psalm 23:4

Take delight in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart. Psalm 37:4

- Psalms are poetry, generally meant to be put to music, though the translations out of their original and beautiful language often makes that hard today.
- Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years.
- The Psalms have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person. Psalms of sorrow, psalms of praise, prophetic psalms, and words of encouragement still make this one of the most popular books in the Bible.






PSALMS

- Proverbs is known for its short instructions for living an effective life on earth. It contains no stories or theology, as many other Old Testament books do. It simply states wisdom for all to enjoy and use.
- Two strong principles emphasized in Proverbs include listening to those who have gone before us, such as parents, teachers, and older people in general. The other principle is having humility. We are encouraged not to speak rashly or without seeing the consequences of our acting arrogant.



1.	The most quoted Proverb of this decade contains instructions for us to trust in the Lord and not to rely on this solely. (Proverbs 3:5)
2.	This feeling toward God is the beginning of true knowledge. (Proverbs 1:7)
3.	Everything you do flows from this part of you, so guard it. (Proverbs 4:23)
4.	This Proverb compares friends to this type of substance. (Proverbs 27:17)
5.	Pride is generally followed by this, so don't be haughty. (Proverbs 16:18)
6.	This Proverb states that a certain response to anger can stop a fight. (Proverbs 15:1)
7.	We are supposed to honor the Lord with this, also known in Bible times as "the first fruits of all your crops." (Proverbs 3:9)

CLAIMS TO FAME: First Gospel in the New Testament

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- The visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus Herod's slaughter of the infants, and
- Jesus' parents fleeing with him to Egypt to escape
- Jesus tells Peter that he will be primary in his building of the Church (Upon this rock...)
- Jesus pays tax by his disciples finding a fish with a coin in its mouth.
- The story of Judas' suicide

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." *Matthew 11:28*

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." *Matthew 28:19*

- Matthew was writing to Jews as opposed to Gentiles, which is why his gospel often quotes the Old Testament to show how prophecy was fulfilled. The other gospels don't do that.
- The book contains a genealogy that dates back to Abraham. It differs from a genealogy in early Luke. Some say that is because one is a list of legal parentage and the other is a bloodline. Because women died in childbirth often and men had come to have less longevity, often there were remarriages and adoptions. The list in Matthew contained names of legal parents, or those who were the parents at the time a person came of age.
- The book is also famous for containing the Great Commission, listed above in Matthew 28:19.





MATTHEW

Matthew is the first gospel and was written by Jesus' apostle by that name. It was written around 60 AD. Matthew was writing to Jews as opposed to gentiles, which is why his gospel often quotes the Old Testament to show how prophecy was fulfilled. The other gospels aren't as much about that.

1.	In this famous passage, Jesus brings hope to all by promising to be with us always, even until the end of this. (Matthew 28:20)	
2.	In this beloved passage known as the Great Commission, Jesus says to make this of the people in all nations. (Matthew 28:19)	
3.	Matthew had this occupation before becoming an apostle, and probably was a ruthless person prior to his salvation. (Matthew 9:9)	
4.	The verse attests that following Christ makes life easier and more joyful, though sometimes it feels like the opposite. Jesus offers this to the weary and heavy-laden. (Matthew 11:28)	
5.	Jesus called Peter a strange term when they first talked about the church. It implied that Peter would always be known as the apostle who started the church. This is the word Jesus used. (Matthew 16:18)	
6.	Jesus says he came to fulfill the law and as well as the words given by these special people. (Matthew 5:17)	
7.	Jesus called this the greatest commandment. (Matthew 22:37)

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

- John Mark is thought first to be a friend of Apostle Peter, but then he traveled with Apostle Paul and his assistant Barnabas on Paul's first missionary journey around Asia Minor. The book is loaded with miracles. Mark's point was to show how powerful, kind, and merciful God is.
- The Gospel of Mark does not mention the birth or childhood of Jesus, but starts with the ministry of John the Baptist.
- Whereas Matthew presents Jesus as King, Mark presents him as a humble servant of man. That is why the verse above from Mark 10 is so beloved.





MARK

John Mark, who wrote this book, is thought first to be a friend of Apostle Peter, but then he traveled with Apostle Paul and his assistant Barnabas on Paul's first missionary journey around Asia Minor.

The book accents the miracles of Christ.

Mark's point was to show how powerful, kind, and merciful God is. Whereas Matthew presents Jesus as king, Mark presents him as a humble servant of man. Mark was most likely the first gospel written, with dating between 50 and 60 AD, or within 20 years of the death of Christ.

1.	Jesus said, surprisingly, that a certain day of the week was made for man. It shows that men are more important to God than laws. This is the day. (Mark 2:27)	
2.	The Bible implies that Jesus was biologically fathered by the Holy Spirit. However, Mary and Joseph went on to have other children after his birth. Jesus' biological half-brothers were named Simon, Judas, Joseph, and this man. (Mark 6:3)	
3.	Jesus tells us to pick up this thing daily, which means to put his ideas in front of our own. (Mark 8:34)	
4.	Jesus says that we can have whatever we ask for, in faith, as long as we do this also. (Mark 11:24)	
5.	Jesus said he came not to start a rebellion or cause trouble, but rather to do this. (Mark 10:45)	
6.	Jesus proclaimed that this belongs to the little children. (Mark 10:14)

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the special Christmas story of shepherds watching over their flock by night.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Story of John the Baptist's birth to Elizabeth and Zechariah
- Shepherds watching over their flocks by night, who saw the host of angels at the birth of Jesus
- First miraculous catch of fish on the Lake of Gennesaret
- Raising of the widow's son from the dead in Nain
- Parable of the good Samaritan
- The rich man and Lazarus meet different fates after death
- The conversation between Jesus and the robbers as they are dying on the crosses

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost. Luke 19:10

Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they divided up his clothes by casting lots. Luke 23:34

- Much of the material in to Luke's gospel involves Jesus' dealings with individuals. Many are not wealthy or part of the acceptable society of their day. They include many sinners. Hence, Luke is considered a gospel of extremely good news-for the common man. This is why stories show up in Luke such as the Good Samaritan (who helps the injured man while religious leaders pass right by him). The conversations between the robbers on the cross with Jesus show the Lord's love for those who have committed crimes.
- While Matthew attempts to prove Christ's kingship, Luke shows him as the one who offers salvation to all humanity-Jew and Gentile alike.





Luke is considered a gospel of extremely good news for the common man. This is why stories are included such as the Good Samaritan (who helps an injured man while religious leaders pass right by him). The conversations between the robbers on the crosses near Jesus show the Lord's grace for those who have committed crimes.

While Matthew attempts to prove Christ's kingship, Luke shows him as the one who offers salvation to all humanity—Jew and gentile alike. It is thought to have been written shortly after the Gospel of Mark was completed, around 60 AD.
